Resources for Form I

The Collects: the first is based on a quotation by St. Augustine, found in his Confessions, the second is from the Book of Common Prayer, 1979.

The Affirmation Form I, the Prayers of the People, the Confession and Absolution are drawn from The Church of England's Common Worship.

The Affirmation Form II is from Daily Prayers for All Seasons, supplement liturgical resource from the Episcopal Church.

The Collects after the Prayers of the People: first is from A New Zealand Prayer Book, the second is from our BCP.

The Post Communion Prayers: Form I is from the Scottish Episcopal Church, and Form II is from The Episcopal Church's approved resource, Enriching Our Worship.

The Eucharistic Prayer was written in house. I drew upon Micah 6:8, Romans 8:38-39, Ephesians 3:16-19, and portions of St. Julian of Norwich's Showings, as translated by Clifton Wolters, and found in prayer form in The Saint Helena Breviary.



The Affirmation of Faith/Creed

This text of the Nicene Creed omits the phrase ‘and the Son’ in the third paragraph, recovering the original text of the First Councils of Nicaea and Constantinople (325 and 381CE respectively) and once again aligning ourselves with our brothers and sisters in the Orthodox Church.
